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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In most of the areas we examined, City operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over safeguarding of public resources.

As referenced above, we noted certain matters that we communicated to City management and Mayor and City Council in a letter dated December 10, 2019, related to cost allocations and building permits. We appreciate the City's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Woodland from January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the City's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2018, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Procurement – public works
- Payroll – overtime, leave balances and accruals
- Costs allocation plan – equitable distribution of indirect costs
- Accounts payable – electronic funds transfers
- Accounts receivable – general fees and charges including building permits

INFORMATION ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Woodland, located in both Cowlitz and Clark counties, was incorporated on March 26, 1906. The City provides police, emergency medical aid, street maintenance, sanitation, health, recreation, library, parks, public improvements and planning and zoning services to approximately 6,150 citizens. Additional services include water supply treatment and distribution and wastewater collection and treatment services.

An elected, seven-member Council and a separately elected Mayor govern the City. The Council appoints management to oversee the City's daily operations as well as its 44 employees. For fiscal years 2018, the City operating revenues totaled approximately \$11.8 million.
